

Fossil Graveyards

In various parts of the world are buried vast numbers of organisms. These areas are referred to as "fossil graveyards."

- The picture on the left, is from Agate Spring, Nebraska (Nelson 1931). It is a mass burial of large number of mammals. Included in the graveyard are rhinoceros, camel, giant boar, and many others. It is estimated that the bones of more than 9,000 complete animals are buried in one hill. They are all piled one on top of another in a helter-skelter fashion. The graveyard is horizontal and appears to have been laid down by water.
- Geiseltal, Germany is home to another fossil graveyard. Included in this deposit are more than six thousand types of fossil vertebrae. Insects, mollusks, and plants are also found in this graveyard. Millions are buried.
- Siberia and Alaska is the location of a frozen fossil graveyard. Buried in the frozen muck are millions of woolly mammoths. They are so plentiful that they are "mined" for their ivory tusks. Some are so well preserved that they have been thawed out and eaten.

There are hundred of other fossil graveyards. All evidence of a great earth wide flood.
